Green Cleaning – Training Workshop for Murrindindi Shire Council By Sue McNair

As part of MCN's Green Business Program free assessments at over 40 locations were conducted over the last three years. Interested parties could also ask for an assessment of their cleaning chemicals and procedures.

Such a free audit of cleaning chemicals and procedures was conducted by MCN for the Murrindindi Shire Council at the Alexandra Office in March this year. The results of this audit indicated considerable room for improvement as it revealed duplication of many products present on site that perform the same task (rather than one product performing numerous tasks). More importantly, the audit also found that many of the products used in the office contained toxic chemicals known to be detrimental to health, particularly if exposed to over the long term.

Following on from these results, on October 28, 2014 a training workshop on sustainable cleaning products and procedures, involving 16 staff and cleaning contractors of Murrindindi Shire Council, was conducted with financial support from Murrindindi Climate Network.

The training workshop was delivered by Bridget Gardner, founding director of the consulting company Fresh Green Clean. Bridget is Australia's leading sustainable cleaning expert and is also a regular writer for industry journals, a presenter at conferences and a trainer of local government departments and corporate institutions.

The half- day session saw commitments from representatives across various Council departments and throughout the organisation. The training introduced a Risk Management Framework covering factors such as Low Harm, Clean Air, Green Hygiene, Minimal Materials, Energy Efficient and Waste Wise. In each of these areas, benchmark parameters can be applied when developing guidelines to assist in the procurement of cleaning products.

Following on from this training workshop, MCN is pleased to see that seven council staffers put their hands up to form a Steering Committee in order to establish guidelines for the procurement of environmentally sustainable cleaning products at Murrindindi Shire Council.

What's happening at the Wetlands! By Glenda Woods

Our wonderful Y Water Discovery Centre and Tourist Information is up and running and a big thank you to all our Friends who have also become volunteers at the centre, keeping it open 7 days a weeks from 9 – 5, a huge undertaking. If you are not yet a volunteer I urge you to consider becoming one or perhaps you might like to be a tour guide. Please contact either Pauline Roberts or Julie Blyth if interested and you will receive training.

You will have noticed a number of changes in the wetlands during the past year. The most obvious is the clearing work we have undertaken between the YWDC and the suspension bridge. We employed a contractor and you can see the results of his two long days. All the dead organic material has been mulched, plus a huge section of honeysuckle between the path and the highway has been destroyed. This area will be closely monitored to deal with the weed growth and in winter 2015, this area will be the focus for revegetation work. Volunteers will be in demand then! We are planning a platypus hide by the river. Some short term pain will lead to a vastly *improved entrance to the wetlands whilst still* providing valuable habitat. No mulching is proposed elsewhere in the wetlands. We have almost completed our spraying of honeysuckle as part of the 3rd year of our Community for Nature grant. Richard Cudmore, a licensed contractor has covered the entire north section of the wetlands in the last fortnight and you should notice a difference in the next couple of weeks. We have used approved chemicals that act only on honeysuckle. Richard will do a follow up day or two in January and the committee are very pleased with the outcomes so far from this spraying program. The grant is making a huge difference and has allowed us to improve and protect the habitat of the wetlands.

Focus on Fauna



One of the most exquisitely crafted bird nests would surely be that of the Grey Fantail. The nest shown at left was discovered, still under construction, in a tangle of Swamp Paperbarks (Melaleuca ericifolia). This nest is quite well camouflaged, unlike some Grey Fantail nests we have seen located on a bare branch in full view of any observer (or predator).

Both the male and female birds share nest construction and incubation and were seen nearby collecting material, including carpet underfelt. One of them is shown at right.

After some recent heavy downpours, the nest is looking slightly bedraggled and soggy (see below), but now holds a single egg. The usual clutch is 2 to 3 eggs, so we will keep discreetly monitoring activity at the nest.



Fox Control Workshop

On Saturday 22nd November 21 people attended the UGLN Fox Control Workshop.



Attendees at the free workshop learnt about the different techniques available to implement a fox control program on their properties.



Experts Richard Francis and Andrew Douglas from ABZECO demonstrated and discussed these techniques that included assessment/monitoring, timing, trapping, baiting, fumigation and shooting.

Pest Control/Weed Control for Spring/Summer

-Bridal creeper -Paterson's Curse -Cape Broom -Chilean Needle Grass

- -chilean Neeule Gras
- -Blackberry

Walk down waterways and check for new woody weeds. Cut and paint weeds before they get too big and set seed. Spray Chilean needle grass before it seeds. The best way to distinguish it from other native Astrostipa species is the presence of a collar of short hairs at the point where the awn attaches to the seed. -Broom

As we move into spring Montpellier Broom finishes flowering and English Broom becomes more obvious. English Broom has strappy foliage with large yellow pea flowers. Native peas are also flowering now and some can be mistaken for this weed.

 Remember there is a 50% subsidy for chemical when spraying weeds listed on the Weeds of National Significance data base. Refer to www.depi.gov.au
